Director McGurk inquired on the expense on page 10, line item 39 for Robert Half Finance & Accounting for Temporary labor for Admin week ending 12/29/23-02/16/24 in the amount of \$5,075.14. Manager Hopkins replied the expense is for multiple weeks.

Director McGurk inquired on the expense on page 13, line item 64 for Fresno Valves and Castings Inc. for OCR Headworks Slide Gates project-Slide gates with electrical actuators in the amount of \$49,649.51. Manager Hopkins replied the abbreviation “OCR” stands for Old Calaveras River.

Director McGurk inquired on the expense on page 19, line item 163 for TNT Industrial Contractors Inc. for Low Lift P-1 replacement project-Piping installation in the amount of \$99,853.00. Manager Hopkins replied the expense includes labor, equipment and material.

Director Cortopassi inquired on the expense on page 13, line item 64 for Fresno Valves and Castings Inc. for OCR Headworks Slide Gates project-Slide gates with electrical actuators in the amount of \$49,649.51. Manager Hopkins replied the gates control the flow at Bellota down the Old Calaveras River.

Director Cortopassi inquired on the expense on page 13, line item 62 for Ecco Equipment Corp. for Tom Allen Recharge Pond-Rental of Dozer Crawler 11/22/23-12/20/23 in the amount of 23,138.44. Manager Hopkins replied the rental of equipment is charged on a monthly basis. Maintenance Manager Higaes added the equipment was rented for a total of two months. There was some difficulty dozing the hard pan. Director Cortopassi suggested staff manage the project more efficiently to help reduce rental expenses.

4. Stockton East Water District – Approve April 2024 Salary Adjustment per MOU Memo

Manager Hopkins provided the Board with the 2024 Salary Adjustment Memo. Finance Director Ram reported according to the 2020-2026 Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between Stockton East Water District and its employees, a yearly salary adjustment is required effective April 1, 2024. The MOU provides for a salary adjustment equivalent to 80% of the CPI net change with a minimum increase of 2.5% and a maximum of 6.0%. The index for 2024 ending January 31st shows a net increase of 2.93% and 80% CPI net change is equal to 2.35%, which falls below the minimum 2.5% increase.

5. Stockton East Water District – Acceptance of April 2024 Board of Directors Per Diem Increase Per Ordinance 13 Memo

Manager Hopkins provided the Board the 2024 Board of Directors Per Diem Increase Memo. Manager Hopkins reported in accordance with Section 6 of the Amended Ordinance No. 13, the Board shall receive a 5% per diem increase annually, consistent with Water Code Section 20202. The current per diem rate is \$133.32 and the 5% would increase the rate by \$6.67 to \$139.99. The FY 2024-2025 budget was formulated under the assumption the 5% increase would be accepted, and as such, is sufficiently funded to accommodate the increase. Prior to April 1, the Board must decide to either accept or reject the increase. No action is required to accept the increase; however, Board approved action is required to reject the increase.

No action was taken on this item.

6. Stockton East Water District – Support of CSDA Sponsored Assembly Bill 2060 Memo

Manager Hopkins provided the Board with the CSDA Sponsored Assembly Bill 2060 Memo and a letter of support. Manager Hopkins noted the bill is not a CSDA sponsored bill. The bill was proposed by Assemblymember Esmerelda Soria. Manager Hopkins reported the bill seeks to streamline the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) permitting process in support of Flood-MAR (Managed Aquifer Recharge activities. AB 2060 proposed to codify the goal of streamlining Flood-MAR groundwater recharge permitting. As currently proposed, AB 2060 would indefinitely exempt existing infrastructure or temporary pumps being used to divert flood stage flows from CDFW permitting requirements. Flood flows may be diverted to existing recharge locations or agricultural land but may not be diverted to dairy land application areas, fields where pesticide or fertilizer application occurred within the last 30 days, areas that could cause damage to infrastructure or exacerbate the threat of flood, or land that has not been actively cultivated in the past three years. The bill still requires applicable fees be paid to CDFW and a temporary diversion permit secured from the State Water Resources Control Board.

Director Watkins inquired if the District can divert water through existing facilities without consulting CDFW. Manager Hopkins replied no, not unless it is the District's water. Manager Hopkins added the recharging of floodwater has not yet been extended to adjacent agricultural land since the diversion would require review and approval by the CDFW. The proposed bill would exempt certain floodwater recharge activities from the CDFW permitting requirements.

7. Stockton East Water District – Support of ACWA Sponsored Assembly Bill 2257 Memo
Manager Hopkins provided the Board with the ACWA Sponsored Assembly Bill 2257 Memo and a handout for a letter of support. Manager Hopkins reported Assembly Bill 2257 would require an exhaustion of administrative remedies procedure for water and sewer rates and assessments that, if public agencies elect to follow, would require the public to submit a timely written objection to the ratemaking proposal or new assessment and raise the particular Proposition 218 compliance issues the plaintiff may later litigate. The Proposition 2018 rate setting processes followed by many agencies throughout California have been protested and subsequently challenged through the court. Agencies have few remedies to address challenges to rate setting processes and are required to invest staff time and legal expenses to defend their process. The District is subject to compliance with the rate setting process established by Proposition 218 and, therefore, would benefit from AB 2257 if the District faced a challenge to any future rate setting process.

Director McGurk inquired if the District can set groundwater and surface water rates. Legal Counsel Zolezzi clarified the District can set groundwater rates however, surface water rate setting is subject to Proposition 218.

8. Stockton East Water District – Review of Proposed Rule 176 – Securing Right-of-Way for District Interests Memo

- a. Rule No. 176

Manager Hopkins provided the Board with proposed Rule 176. Manager Hopkins reported the District does not currently have a policy related to the procurement of right-of-way necessary for the District's projects, operations, etc. As such, right-of-way negotiation can be an arduous and lengthy process, requiring Board direction at each step of the process for each landowner providing right-of-way. In some instances, the landowners are unwilling to provide right-of-way by either requesting unreasonable compensation or failing to engage. With the potential need to secure District right-of-way for future projects and the known need of right-of-way for private projects related to the District's mission, staff propose Rule 176 – Securing Right-of-Way for District Interests. The proposed rule will provide staff with the guidance and boundaries necessary to substantially negotiate right-of-way acquisition prior to presenting an agreement to the Board.

Director McGurk inquired what the difference is between a policy and rule. Manager Hopkins replied generally, a policy is guidance for staff whereas a rule is guidance for the constituents. Director McGurk inquired if it is necessary to adopt the rule. Manager Hopkins replied the proposed rule identifies the District's authority to procure right-of-way through eminent domain, thereby providing negotiating transparency to the other negotiating parties. Through the eminent domain process, the District can secure right-of-way from unwilling negotiators. The proposed policy further

reserves the District's right to allow private parties access to the right-of-way for projects that align with the District's interest.

Director Nakaue expressed interest in the proposed rule as it would streamline the process and could prevent any conflict of interests.

The final draft of proposed Rule 176 is scheduled to return for a public hearing and presentation to the Board for approval at the March 19, 2024, following a 10-day notice of public hearing.

9. Stockton East Water District – Review of Proposed Rule 177 – Establishing a Policy for On-Farm Recharge of Surface Water Memo

a. Rule No. 177

Manager Hopkins provided the Board with proposed Rule 177. Manager Hopkins reported proposed Rule 177 would establish two incentive programs to compensate growers who use available surface water during the non-irrigation season. One program would apply to growers that are required to lift water from the waterway for application to the field through the use of a pump. To offset pumping costs estimated by District customers, the program would provide compensation of \$80 per acre-foot of measured net recharge. The second program would apply to growers that are able to apply water to their land(s) by gravity and without the use of a pump. The program would provide rechargers compensation of \$25 per acre-foot of measured net recharge. Both programs would also provide the recharger with a groundwater credit that may be applied to any land owned by the grower. The groundwater credit will be equal to 50% of the measured net recharge. This is in support of the District's current water right applications and the temporary storm water diversion permits obtained on Little John's Creek.

Director Nakaue inquired if the program would be available to landowners who do not necessarily have good recharge ground. Manager Hopkins replied yes, if the land is poor quality there would still be opportunity for the landowner to receive a groundwater credit.

The final draft of proposed Rule 177 is scheduled to return for a public hearing and presentation to the Board for approval at the March 19, 2024, following a 10-day notice of public hearing.

10. Stockton East Water District – Approval of Grant Administration Agreement for SWEEP Block Grant Memo

Manager Hopkins provided the Board with a memo for a Grant Administration Agreement for the SWEEP Block Grant. Manager Hopkins reported the District worked together with North San Joaquin Water Conservation District (NSJWCD) and South San Joaquin Irrigation District (SSJID) to apply for the State Water and Efficiency Program – Block Grant Pilot (SWEEP Block Grant). The districts were awarded the grant in September 2023. SEWD is the lead agency and entered into a grant agreement with the California Department of Food and Agriculture (CDFA) to administer the SWEEP Block Grant for SEWD, NSJWCD, and SSJID's constituents. A grant administration agreement has been developed between the districts to clarify the roles, responsibilities, and funding each district has as part of the SWEEP Block Grant. The agreement states how the general processes of the grant administration will be performed. Legal counsel from each district has reviewed the agreement and feels that the terms are acceptable.

Director Cortopassi inquired if the District has received any applications from constituents. Manager Hopkins replied the District has not received any completed applications however, the Technical Assistance Providers are working with a few constituents to get those applications completed.

- a. Grant Administration Agreement For State Water Efficiency & Enhancement Program (SWEEP) Block Grant Between Stockton East Water District, South San Joaquin Irrigation District, and North San Joaquin Water Conservation District

A motion was moved and seconded to approve the Grant Administration Agreement For State Water Efficiency & Enhancement Program (SWEEP) Block Grant Between Stockton East Water District, South San Joaquin Irrigation District, and North San Joaquin Water Conservation District and authorize the General Manager to execute the agreement on behalf of SEWD, as presented.

E. COMMITTEE REPORTS

1. Agriculture Operations Committee Meeting, 02/21/24
Director's Atkins, Cortopassi, Sanguinetti, Watkins, Manager Hopkins and Assistant Manager Vega attended the Agricultural Operations Committee Meeting on February 21st. Director Watkins reported the committee reviewed Rule's 176 and 177. The committee will discuss Rule 109, Rule 159 and Policy No. 3085 at the next committee meeting.
2. Electrical Power Alternatives Committee Meeting, 02/22/24
Director's Atkins, McGurk, Sanguinetti, Manager Hopkins, Assistant Manager Vega and District Engineer Evensen attended the Electrical Power Alternatives Committee Meeting on February 22nd. President Atkins reported the committee discussed several energy-generating options to offset the District's water treatment plant's rising electricity costs incurred via PG&E. The committee discussed a solar option through PG&E's Net Energy Metering 2.0 Aggregate program (NEM2A). Director McGurk reported the committee concluded hydrogen energy saving options are not feasible at this time. The next meeting will be scheduled after additional information has been obtained.
3. San Joaquin Farm Bureau Federation Monthly Water Committee Meeting, 02/27/24
Assistant Manager Vega attended the San Joaquin Farm Bureau Federation Monthly Water Committee Meeting on February 27th. Manager Hopkins reported Assistant Manager Vega provided his notes from the meeting. Manager Hopkins reported East Bay Municipal Utility District (EBMUD) appointed Mary Campbell as the Community Affairs Representative. Ms. Campbell will be attending the SJFB Water Advisory Committee meetings moving forward. North San Joaquin Water Conservation District (NSJWCD) has appointed a new Director, Brandon Colburn in the wake of Director Marden Wilber's passing. During the Delta Report there was discussion on the Twin Tunnels, Water Rights and protesting the Sites Reservoir Project. South San Joaquin Irrigation District (SSJID) reported their irrigation season is scheduled to begin on March 13th. San Joaquin County (SJC) reported they are analyzing flooding possibilities. During the SJC Assessor's Office Meeting it was conveyed the County did not wish to discuss individual situations however, they were willing to discuss methods used when valuating land. A sub-committee would like to investigate the crop pricing to ensure it is representative of the situation in the county.
4. Eastern Water Alliance (EWA)/DREAM Monitoring Committee Meeting, 02/28/24
Director McGurk and District Engineer Evensen attended the DREAM Monitoring Committee Meeting on February 28th. District Engineer Evensen reported the committee discussed extending the pilot project to the end of April. Director McGurk reported the request for extension was a result

of Well K-13 experiencing mechanical issues. The next Eastern Water Alliance meeting is scheduled for March 7th at 10:00 a.m.

F. REPORT OF GENERAL MANAGER

1. Water Supply Report as of 02/20/24

Manager Hopkins provided a handout of the Water Supply Report for information only that included storage, release, and production data collected from various sources as of midnight last night.

There is 211,160 AF in storage at New Hogan Reservoir. Current releases are set at 272 cfs. There is 2,000,126 AF in storage at New Melones Reservoir. Current releases are set at 468 cfs. Current release at Goodwin Dam to Stanislaus River is set at 1,002 cfs and release to all water users is set at 0 cfs. The district water treatment plant (WTP) is currently processing 22 mgd. North Stockton is currently utilizing 3 mgd. South Stockton is currently utilizing 4 mgd. Cal Water is currently utilizing 8 mgd. The City of Stockton WTP is currently processing 9 mgd.

3. Report on General Manager Activities

a. ACWA State Legislative Committee Meeting, 03/01/24

Manager Hopkins reported Consultant Barkett attended the ACWA State Legislative Committee Meeting on March 1st. This item will be brought back to the Board next week when Consultant Barkett is present.

b. Stockton East Water District Activities Update

Manager Hopkins reported the District's Master Plans are currently evaluating the condition of the Peter's Pipeline. Given the Board's extensive knowledge of the Peter's Pipeline, Manager Hopkins suggested the Board meet with the consultant to discuss the history in more detail.

Manager Hopkins reported District Staff and Legal Counsel hosted Director Nakaue on March 4th providing an orientation.

Manager Hopkins reported the Engineering Staff supported Grant Application Workshops held at North San Joaquin Irrigation District (NSJID) and South San Joaquin Irrigation District (SSJID) on February 22nd. There were 30 interested constituents who attended the workshop at SSJID and 60 interested constituents who attended the workshop at NSJID. California Special District Association reached out to interview the districts regarding the State Water Energy & Efficiency (SWEEP) Block Grant Program.

Manager Hopkins reported the Project Management Committee has met to discuss the five-year Groundwater Sustainability Plan (GSP) update. The Department of Water Resources (DWR) identified eight inches of subsidence located in the areas between Alpine Road, HWY 88, Jack Tone Road and HWY 26 over the past eight years. Staff is currently working to confirm these findings.

4. Stockton East Water District Finance Update

Finance Director Ram reported for investments LAIF's current interest rate is 4%, and California Class annualized interest rate is 5.44%. The District has more than doubled the interest income this year. The 2023 Final Bills have been mailed out to all customers. Staff is currently working on a

water rates presentation to bring to the Agricultural Operations Committee for review before bringing to the Board.

G. DIRECTOR REPORTS

1. ACWA DC Conference, 02/26/24-02/29/24
Directors Atkins, Sanguinetti, Watkins and Manager Hopkins attended the ACWA DC Conference. President Atkins reported the trip was very eventful. President Atkins reported they had the chance to meet with congressmen Harder and other public officials to discuss District projects and gained support for funding opportunities. Director Watkins reported Consultant Boesch did a great job coordinating various meetings with the elected officials.
2. AgVenture Days – Lodi, 02/29/24
No District representative attended this event.

H. COMMUNICATIONS

1. Department of Water Resources – Award Notification for Watershed Resilience Grant Program Letter, 02/14/24
Manager Hopkins provided the Board with an award Notification for Watershed Resilience Grant Program letter from the Department of Water Resources (DWR). Manager Hopkins reported the District has been awarded \$2M through DWR’s Watershed Resilience Grant Program.

Subject: Benchmark Survey for Subsidence Monitoring

Dear Evensen:

On March 2, 2024, Ardurra performed a field survey to collect elevation data for several NGS benchmarks in the Linden, CA area. The purpose of the survey was to attempt to verify claims by DWR that roughly 7 inches of subsidence had been observed over the past 7 years in the area. Lacking any collected survey data in the area from this time period, we proposed to survey the current elevation of various NGS benchmarks with published elevations and compare published versus current surveyed elevations.

The benchmarks used are all located along a 4.25 mile stretch of Comstock Road, spanning from near Jack Tone Road at the west to Clements Road at the east. The benchmarks were all set in 1962, with elevation data originally published in the NGVD29 datum. Current published elevations have been converted to NAVD88 datum and adjusted using the GEOID18 (2018) model. It is important to note that the NGS published elevations do not reflect an actual surveyed elevation from 2018. The comparisons made herein, thus do not represent a precise measurement difference, but rather a relative observation between current surveyed elevations and published elevations based upon original data which has been converted to NAVD88 datum and adjusted by the GEOID18 model. Our observations are shown below.

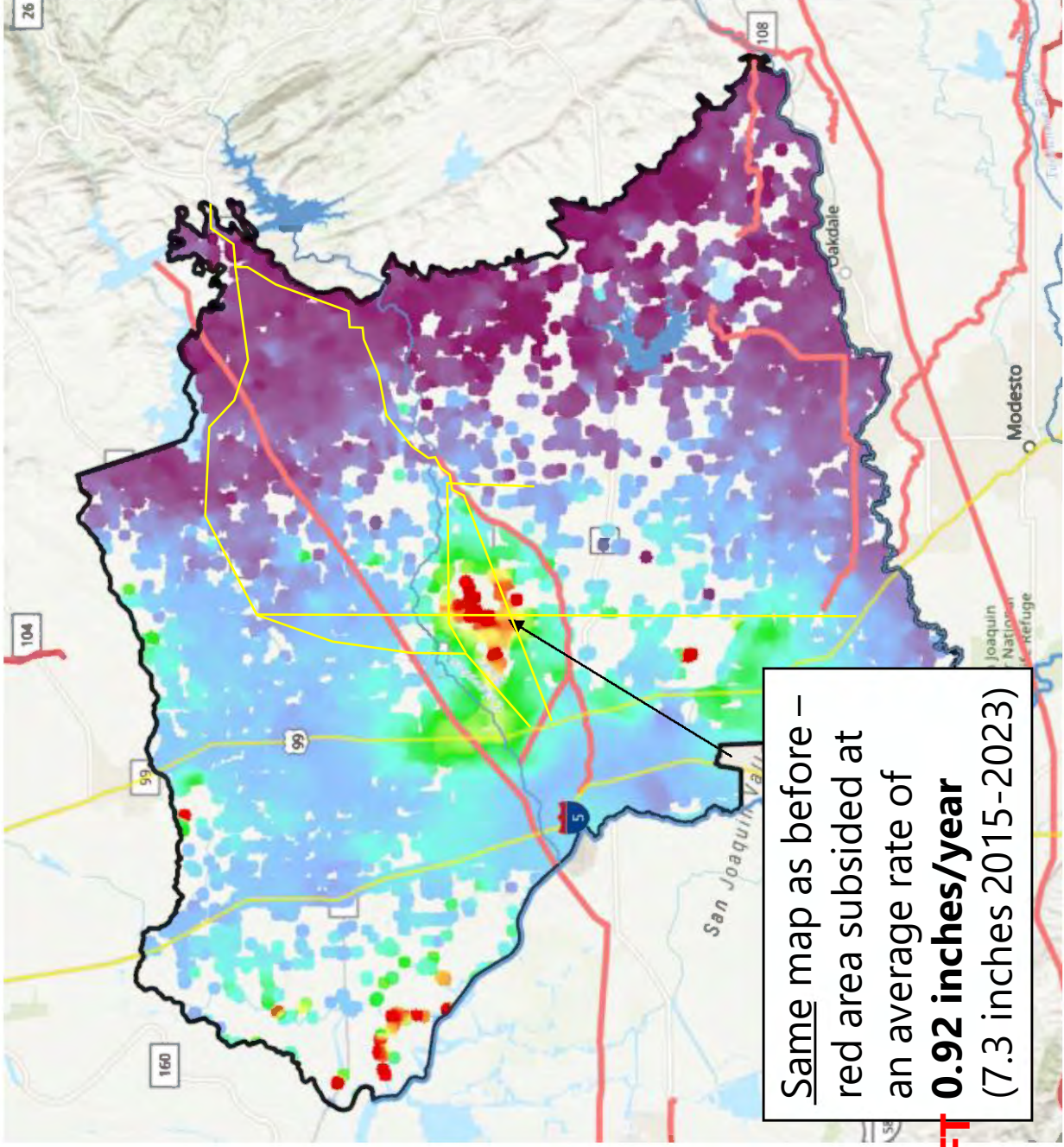

This Week In Federal Policy

Northern California Water Association, 03/04/24

House and Senate appropriators released six final fiscal 2024 spending bills Sunday, including the Energy and Water and Interior and Environment bills. The House is slated to begin the process and take a key vote this week (ahead of a March 8 deadline) under suspension of the rules, which requires a two-thirds majority for passage, on the first half of the FY 2024 funding bills: Agriculture-FDA, Commerce-Justice-Science, Energy and Water, Interior-Environment, Military Construction-VA, and Transportation-HUD after last week's passage of a short-term continuing resolution (CR) to extend the funding deadline for several agencies and programs to March 8 and the remaining to March 22 to avoid a partial government shutdown.

In the Energy and Water bill, the Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) would see what Senate appropriators called an "historic funding level" of \$8.68 billion, an increase of \$21 million from enacted levels. That includes \$2.77 billion for the Harbor Maintenance Fund and \$2.2 billion for flood and storm damage reduction. The Bureau of Reclamation (Reclamation) would receive \$1.92 billion, a cut of \$31 million compared to enacted levels. About \$1.7 billion would go to the agency's water and related resources account, about \$451 million more than President Biden requested. However, the current bill would cut \$51 million from the Fish and Wildlife Service compared to FY 2023 levels.

In the Senate, Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell, the longest-serving Senate leader in history, announced his decision to step down from his position in November. McConnell, aged 82, declared his retirement from the Republican leadership in the Senate, emphasizing the importance of knowing when to transition to the next phase of life. He plans to serve out his Senate term until January 2027 but will relinquish his leadership role.

The White House Office of Management & Budget (OMB) is finalizing new guidance regarding federal regulations' impacts on ecosystem services, defined as contributions to human welfare from the environment or ecosystems. This guidance aims to ensure that agencies, particularly the EPA, do not overlook the significant benefits of rules. It builds upon previous revisions to broader cost-benefit review guidance (Circular A-4), which emphasized estimating greenhouse gas reduction benefits and considering effects on disadvantaged populations.
